Native Peoples	Coast Salish People	Native Plants
<p>Communities of people who have lived in a location or region for many generations, since time immemorial, and have a strong connection to that environment.</p>	<p>A group of native peoples who share a common language family and have lived in what is now known as northern Oregon, western Washington and British Columbia; these communities are alive and thriving today.</p>	<p>Plants who have lived in a specific environment for many generations and often have adapted special characteristics to live well in that place.</p>
